The importance of an individual's early relationship experience is now widely accepted among developmental scientists and clinicians. John Bowlby's ideas about inner working models, Daniel Stern's ideas about representations of self and relationships with others, and Selma Fraiberg's Ghosts in the Nursery metaphor all offer conceptual guidance for understanding how early experiences of "being with another" are internalized and carried forward. Therapists, social workers, home visitors and early childhood teachers, will find a useful clinical tool in even an introductory understanding of these phenomena. This workshop will provide just such an understanding by offering an introduction to how the early experience of "getting care" contributes to the core of one's sense of worth and potency and expectations regarding the availability of and sensitivity of caregivers.
